Traveling Through Panama

Trolleys Around Oneonta

From Oneonta Street Railway to Southern NY Railway Part III

Continuing where the previous class from July left off, we will continue to explore the trolley lines within the City limits, covering material we did not get to in the July class. Using vintage photos, narrative and discussion, we will continue to explore the streets in Oneonta that the trolley traveled along, and the local businesses and people the line served. We will also discuss the end of service within the City limits.

Introduction to Gender Diversity: Transgender 101

A presentation of the components and diversity of gender – the lived experience of persons who are gender non-conforming and information on the expanding vocabulary around gender and sexuality. Ample time for Q&A provided. Information on local and national resources will be provided.

Practical Ideas on How to Organize Your Affairs Prior to the Inevitable (This is mostly a repeat of the course given in October 2019)

We will discuss how to organize your paperwork so that you and your family will not feel overwhelmed upon your death or the death of your spouse. We will talk about making your wishes clear in order to avoid squabbles among your heirs and also to give you practical ideas so that you are not spending money on needless professional fees.

Things I Learned While Traveling that I Did Not Expect

Photos and stories from a dozen or so countries including “Hoisting children through a bus window”, “Bananas for the monkeys, then peanuts”, “It was the best \$500 I ever spent for one hour”, “You really can send people an email from a foreign country and they will send you \$1000”, “I met a man who made his own island”, “The Chicken Village”, and more.

FDR's Second Term

As Roosevelt’s first term came to a close, assumptions about the responsibilities of government had changed dramatically, but economic problems still persisted. New Deal Legislation was under attack from left and right. Some Americans believed that fascism represented the best alternative, while many of the best and brightest in Europe fled to this country to escape fascism. This is also a good time to examine the special relationship that existed between FDR and Eleanor. This course is a continuation of last year’s Roosevelt Takes Command, but the material from that earlier course is not required to enjoy the current offering.

From Professor Gilbert to “Ukulele Steve”: A Hopefully Entertaining Story

Following a brief description of a personal journey from teacher to teaching-entertainer, I will introduce, discuss and perform approximately 25 songs per class (of the approximately 150 songs in my repertoire). As it is impossible to totally suppress the psychology-teacher in my nature, some information, observations, and speculations about aging and music will seep in throughout!

Oneonta to Mohawk Trolley Line

Building on the class "Trolleys Around Oneonta", this class will explore the push north by the Oneonta Street Railway that ultimately connected Oneonta to Cooperstown and the Mohawk Valley. As with the previous class, this course looks not only on the equipment used, but also at the trolley line within the context of the communities it served, examining what it was, where it went, how it affected those communities, and how changes in the area shaped it and ultimately rendered it obsolete.

Building Bridges in Cuba....although the bridges I built turned out to be different ones from my expectations!

Last fall when I wrote my original proposal about my Cuba trip that I had not yet actually gone on, my description for the course was based on documentation and expectations I had received from the volunteer organization with which I had signed up. The reality turned out to be quite different from these expectations...although the trip still provided a diverse and engaging look into Cuban culture and its people. However, I did NOT create ceramic tiles for the community, nor did I participate in dance workshops and sports games with the children, and although I thoroughly enjoyed my meals, members of the arts community rarely joined us for those meals. I DID, however, live in a former barrio outside Havana, and I DID spend much time at Muraleando, a community art center, and I DID stay in local casas partiulares, family run bed and breakfasts in private homes. And I DID experience and enjoy local foods and music and art!

And on the extension, I was also able to explore diverse parts of Cuba - Trinidad, Cien Fuegos, and the Vinales Valley, all of which were unique and delightful. So, although not quite the trip I had expected, it turned out to be one that was fulfilling and satisfying in other ways.

“Love Harry!” Christian Imagination in the Wizarding World of Harry Potter

20 Years of Innovation: Diaghilev's Ballets Russes

The Ballets Russes is widely regarded as the most influential ballet company of the 20th century. The world of ballet changed forever when Serge Diaghilev's Ballets Russes took Paris by storm in May 1909. Diaghilev brought together cutting-edge composers, designers and dancers including Nijinsky, Picasso, Chanel and Stravinsky. These artists revolutionized ballet with exotic costumes and sets, stunning dance performances and choreography. Through photos, film and illustrations, this class will acquaint participants with this brilliant dance company.

Genealogy for Beginners

This course is a modification of the genealogy course presented in Fall 2019 for people interested in researching their family roots and creating a family tree. This 2 session course is designed to show you how to begin your search and create an online family tree using ancestry.com (you may use a different application if you wish). We go over how to use online sources (census records, city directories, military records, etc.) and learn how and where to apply for other documents from local, state and other government sources to gain information about your ancestors. How to use DNA testing in your research will also be discussed, as well as how to break through brick walls when you think you have come to a dead end in your research.

2020 U.S. Presidential Election: What Happened, Why, and So What?

The course will consist of one two-hour session during which the facilitators, Professor of Political Science Laurel Elder of Hartwick College, Paul Scheele, retired professor of political science at SUNY Oneonta, and Richard Barberio, associate professor of political science at SUNY Oneonta, will offer their descriptions and analyses of the November elections, followed by time for class members to share their assessments, insights, and questions. Attention will be paid to both presidential and congressional elections because, constitutionally at least, both president and Congress share in setting national policies.

The Year Without a Summer - 1816

A look at the cause of that lack of a summer and the effects, state and local, using reports from 200 years ago.
